WHERE HAVE YOU BEEN IN THE LAST FEW MONTHS?

It seems amazing that it has been so long since we had a single out! What you wouldn't know is that we've been working away so hard since the last time we were really seen out and about - around the time of The Memphis Sessions release in Britain, probably, Just because we're not seen in Britain doesn't mean that we're on holiday (no such luck!), we've been in France, where 'Sweet Little Mystery' was a hit at the beginning of 1989, and we've been doing the really important business - recording the new LP. We've been in a studio in England which is really spectacular - a converted mill with a glass floor in the control room with a real stream running underneath - you can see the ducks swimming by! It is a fantastic place and we've loved working there - even more because we've been doing our own half of the LP there. Just to explain, our plan is to record half of the LP and produce it ourselves and the other half produced with someone else, as vet unknown!

WHEN ARE ALL YOUR BIRTHDAYS, AND WHAT DO YOU DO ON THEM?

Marti's is 23rd March, Graeme's is 15th April, Neil's is 8th June and Tom's is 22nd lune. We do whatever we would usually be doing in a normal work day on our birthdays - just like anyone else, we don't get a day off just because we are a year older! Marti always seems to come off especially badly birthday wise - we have always been working or doing TV shows abroad when it is his - this year we were in the studio in England recording, and by the time Neil and Tommy's birthdays come along we'll be in the studio in

America. The best birthdays are spent at home, especially as this means getting to open all the presents and cards you lot send us on our actual birthdays instead of weeks later!

WHAT DO YOU PREFER —TOURING, WRITING, RECORDING, TELEVISION/RADIO WORK OR PROMOTION?

Definitely, easily and by far writing and recording. Although these are the hardest things and the most nerve-racking they are also the most satisfying and don't forget - without the creative time making records, we wouldn't ever do anything! Touring is the biggest buzz - an immediate buzz from playing to a live audience and having all that feedback and it's probably the point where we are physically in best shape. We spend the days travelling to the gig and the nights playing, but on days off, we really have the time to ourselves after soundchecking and all that, so we can swim or sunbathe or work out or shop good fun and relaxing after the rigour of playing. We always come back from tours thinner and fitter than we were when we left! Promotion is the hardest as it is non-stop when we have a record out, and we can be anywhere from Holland to Chicago in the space of a week!

CAN ANY OF YOU PLAY INSTRUMENTS OTHER THAN THE ONES THAT WE KNOW YOU CAN?

So much work goes into becoming proficient in an instrument that we really only dabble in other stuff. We do work quite hard at keeping up our own instrument and improving all the time, but on nights when we might be messing around, you could quite easily see any of us playing the piano, or Graeme playing the guitar, or Neil playing drums! Only for pleasure though.











HOW WET WET WET WON THE WORLD

GAMBIA, AFRICA

PART FOUR: SUN, SWEAT & SINGLES

THE GAMBIA was a place we'd only heard mentioned on TV before Roland Hill, the head of the video department at Phonogram, mentioned that he'd been offered a package on flights and accommodation there and "Would we like to go there to shoot our next video..." Now, people coming up to us and saving stuff like 'How would you like to go to Africa to shoot your next video?' is still the strange, hard to get used to, pure luxury of what we do (and we never know what might happen next truly glamourous) so at the time we were, well, sceptical to say the least! Getting the storyboard right — the directors sketches of what he wanted to happen phrase by phrase - was our first worry as we didn't want to be seen as the sort of band who ponce about on yachts and stuff as we're just not normally like that (in fact we're never like that!). We eventually did a landrover shot when we were there which, if the director had suggested it to us at the time we probably would have said no to, but when we actually got there we realised how unglamourous we can look at times! The next real problem was getting the time to have our shots for yellow fever and all sorts of other weird tropical diseases. We spent an afternoon doing interviews feeling really ill because of the jags. The really brill thing was, when 'Wishing' came out, we had run a competition in a Scottish newspaper 'The Sunday Mail' to win a part in our next video. The girl who won it didn't realise that she was going to have to go to Africa to do it! She had a great time, but then, so did we. Gambia is a tiny country with few real industries and only a tiny, newly started tourist

industry. There was only one hotel

in the area where we filmed and miles of white beaches - paradise in a way. African music seems to capture the sunlight in bright sparkly guitar riff and harmonious singing and we just loved listening to local artists - the record shop was the hub of the village for teenagers. Another vital part of life was the local radio station which took the idea of serving the community almost too far! When we were there, there were all sorts of messages being broadcast over the air - even a message from someone's wife who had called into the station! We sang 'May You Never' live on the radio there (remember, at that point, we didn't have an LP to give them to play) and they played 'Sweet Little Mystery' all the time. It was great fun being there, and a place we'd love to go back to sometime.

Back in Scotland for ther customary Wet summer we had a lot of work to do. There are always two things people say about a second single when the first has been a big hit. One — "Maybe they're just One Hit Wonders" and Two - "It's not as good as the first one, is it?". Both of these sayings drove us crazy over the next four weeks as 'Sweet Little Mystery' steadily climbed the charts - needless to say we felt they were proved wrong on both counts! On a bit of a different track, but still relevant, is the fact that we should say a heartfelf thank you to all the fans who voted for us on Mike Smith's morning 'Chartbusters' on Radio One. Radio One didn't playlist 'Sweet Little Mystery' and to a great extend it was a shock when we won 'Chartbusters' for the first time but we really felt that we had popular support because of all of you phoning in to radio stations.



What was really happening in the wake of 'Sweet Little Mystery' were the final touches to 'Popped In Souled Out', remixes, deciding on a track listing, deciding on a different track listing, deciding on different tracks and then changing it back again - all the usual stuff really. We did the photo session for the LP one hot, airless day in London. Everything that could go wrong did! We had wanted the sleeve to be slightly tongue in cheek rather than run of the mill mid eighties soul boys gear like half of the music business (all doc Martens and torn Levis - clothers we are happy wearing but not for our first LP cover) so we decided on a pastiche of the Four Tops and The Beatles, our two favourite groups.



For that we wanted suits like the one Martin Gaye wore when he sang 'I Heard It Through The Grapevine'. The suits came and they just weren't like that. They were strange sizes we had to be sown into them which took ages. It was so hot, that by the time we had managed to get the suits to fit we had to send for more white shirts because the ones we were wearing were soaked through. Getting the front cover just so, with all of our hands in the right positions was hard and the carot soup for lunch sent us over the top and into serious comfort food - hamburgers what else? Doing the back cover shots was quite easy really, as they were much more informal and we had fun swapping instruments all the time and generally messing around. The photographer, Robert Erdman, is a New York fashion photographer and he was such a laugh all day, despite everything. He was shooting from quite high up and using a step ladder, shouting at us to keep going. The hardest bit was at the end, with daylight starting to soften outside at nearly eight o'clock (we had been there since ten) the electricity started to fuse in the block. Some sort of overload in the system caused the fuses to blow but desperate to get

the last shots finished, we had a line of people from Robert down to the fuse box shouting instructions to change the fuses every time they burnt out — in the end they were going every couple of minutes!

Most of that long hot summer we were in a residential studio in the south of England, a beautiful place with tennis courts and horses to ride and fantastic food (Fi, the cook, eventually became part of our onthe-road team because we loved her cooking so much!). In between playing tennis, working out on the lawn and eating banana pie (yum) we had to work really hard! (See, people think it's all fun in this business, but it's not. . .) By late July the LP was well and truly finished, remixed, re-edited tracks chosen and proofs back for the photos for the sleeve so the month of August was all ours and we had a well deserved break, two of us, Tom and Marti going to Miami for a couple of weeks and Graeme going to Spain for a while - Neil stayed home and redecorated! (Some rest. . .) The LP came out on September 9th 1987, a date we'll never forget and went straight in the first chart at Number Two, held off by Michael lackson. The day of the launch we

played live in the Virgin Megastore in Glasgow and blocked the whole of Union Street, grinding the city's traffic to a halt. We even got on the evening news. That must have been one of the most exciting days of our career so far with so many interviews and so much going on all the time and the best feeling in the worldgoing into a record store and seeing copies of your own LP - which had taken so long to record - sitting high up on the Number Two shelf (although it was even better when it went back up to Number One the following January!) The next two months were a sort of fuzz of activity with a European promotional tour and dates abroad and two short tours of the UK (one in September-October and one in December) and decisions, decisions, decisions. . . the hardest one being what to release as the next single — as we explained in SPLASH 1. When all the shouting was over the next single just had to be one of our very favourites. A track that used to be called 'Home and Away' (pretty much our lifestyle at that point) had changed dramatically in the farmhouse recording studio we had spent the summer in and now

it was 'Angel Eyes'. . .

The first charity event we got involved in was a benefit gig for CND in Glasgow closely followed by another gig - this time in the Albert Hall for Greenpeace. It is a terrific relief that Greenpeace and Friends of the Earth and CND have done so very much to change world opinion - although it would be much better to see action from governments rather than just proposals.

Enough political chat, we wanted to tell you that we'd been up to! From just after the release of "The Memphis Sessions" in December 1988, we have constantly been in the studio either writing the new songs or recording them which is probably the most exciting thing we do really, seeing our fledgling ideas take shape and become entities all on their own. We've only come out three times, once to go to Paris where we have three times, once to go to Paris where we have a big hit with "Wishing I Was Lucky" to do a TV show called "Sacre Soirce" and the other twice to do short appearances at two different gigs for very different causes, READ ON.

Greenpeace campaigns to save the whales • to stop nuclear weapons tests • to protect seals, dolphins porpoises and sea turtles . to stop the di close down nuclear power stations and nuclear reprocess ing plants • to stop acid rain and protect the atmosphere • to reduce the trade in endangered species products.

Anyway, we started getting involved in things like that very early on - long before we ever got a record out - and have remained interested in progress of the events we have been involved in. The music business has become so very responsible in the last few years with Live Aid, Mandela Day, Sting campaigning for the safety of the Rainforests. Gabriel, Sting, Springsteen and Tracy Chapman touring the world for Amnesty. It's a good thing, we think, and certainly an example which should be taken up by successful people in other industries - it would be far more effective (if not as wellpublicised) for the managing director of MacDonalds to be campaigning for the Rainforest than a pop star!

ROCK AGAINST THE POLL TAX

The Poll Tax, or Community Charge as it is more euphamistically know, is the Government's replacement for rates the tax levied on householders which was based on the size of your house. The new Poll Tax is levied on the number of people staying in a house, so each person over 18 years old pays an amount instead of it being only the

householder's responsibility. The unfair thing about it is that within the same area, three people, for instance, staying in the same small flat would pay the same amount each in poll tax as one person staying in a great big mansion alone. Obviously this isn't fair and there has been a lot of protest about it in Scotland where the Poll Tax became active on April 1st of this year. (It becomes effective on April 1st 1990 in England and Wales and Northern Ireland).

There is a special committee set up in Scotland to protest about this tax. which includes political parties. churches and charities like Shelter (they think this new tax will increase homelessness in Scotland). This committee helped to set up "Rock Against The Poll Tax" who organised a gig in the Usher Hall, Edinburgh on April 1st to protest about the tax. It was an all-star line up with all the Scottish bands who could possibly make it there, Wet Wet Wet, Deacon Blue, Hue and Cry, Texas, The Silencers, Boom and the Critter Hill Varmits. Jimmy Sommerville sent a message of support, and the only reason The Proclaimers and Simple Minds weren't there was because they were both out of the country at the time.

It was brilliant fun doing it - we did a completely acoustic set with just the five of us and Graeme and Graeme both playing acoustic guitars with unrepeatable versions of "Blue For You" (one of our favourites from the new LP). "temptation" and the John Martyn song that is such a fave of ours "May You Never".

The evening was a great success with write-ups in all the Scottish papers and some of the nationals - on the pop front Number One magazine came up and did a double page on the gig and what the Poll Tax is all about which we thought was brilliant of them. It is the very first time that all the Scottish bands have been so behind a cause and all working together - it was a good feeling and a wonderful idea — wouldn't it be great if we all did another, much bigger gig? You never know. . .

The only other thing that could possibly tempt us out of the studio when we were right in the middle of recording was a visit to the Prince's Trust workshops and a special appearance at the Gala Concert.

The Prince's Trust has unsurprisingly - Prince Charles as its President and has basically been set up to 'help young people help themselves'. What happens is that young people (under 26 years old) can apply to the trust for a grant to help them set up in business, or be successful at something they are more talented at, or help the community in some way. For instance, one young guy about fifteen - was a really

good ping pong player, but in order to really compete in local final that would take him into the national league he needed equipment and the Trust gave him a grant to buy it. It's set up so there is as little red tape as possible and everyone who has an idea gets a fair hearing. We visited the workshops in Norwich in mid April (before going down to London to record something for the gala

concert) and we met people who were working in a trust sponsored community group and jammed with some of the guys and girls who are there using the recording and rehearsal equipment that has been supplied. It was a laugh! We also got to meet Prince Charles who is a charming and very circumspect person. It was great to meet more young musicians (as we have our own studio in Glasgow with other Precious acts working there, we're not short of young musicians to talk to!) and swap ideas with them - it's not so very long ago that we were just as hopeful as they are.

Then we went down to London and had a party on our day off for Graeme Clark's birthday (15th April) which was a surprise birthday party — Graeme thought that we were just going to go out for dinner but we had organised people from all over Britain (and some parts of Europe!) and so we did the birthday stuff, singing songs, popping corks and eating vast chunks of (extremely delicious) cake.

Then it was down to work in earnest. Monday was rehearsal

day. In a big TV show like that with loads of different acts on it and different presenters rehearsal for the artists and the cameras is absolutely vital (this vear's BPI Awards Ceremony looked as though it could have done with more!) Two days before the show is recorded live, everyone turns up at the venue (the Palladium in this case) to go through their songs or routines and check that there are no technical problems, that everything is suitable for the act and that the TV director and producer are happy with the way the show looks. The Palladium is a fine old theatre which we had only ever seen on TV before and with such a smart,

showbizzy stage and a great selection of acts we were pleased to be there working.

When we arrived, Debbie Gibson was going through her routine for 'Electric Youth' (she is sooooo young - just a wee slip of a girl really) and after a quick soundcheck of the songs we were doing ('Keys To Your Heart' and our current favourite favourite from the new LP 'Hold Back The River') we departed for the rehearsal studio where we worked through with the horn section, the new parts for the songs and settled in a new keyboard section Neil had put together back in Glasgow (he's had to stay behind when we went to Norwich because he had to work on this before the gig). We had to be very particular about the sound as we were the only band playing completely live on the bill and so our sound had to be brilliant THE PRINCE'S TRUST

in order to sound even better than the backing tracks other bands, like T'Pau and 'Then Jericho' were using.

On the actual day we were all nerves. Getting to the theatre at 9 a.m. for dress rehearsal (yawn, snuggle) and then having enormous problems with half of the P.A. not working, found us still there at 3 p.m. soundchecking the people from LWT were so nice and so understanding) although we had had to stop for an hour in between to let Dame Kiri Te Kwana soundcheck (!) and to have our photos taken with the new quintuple platinum discs that the people at Precious and Phonogram presented to us (1.5 million sales in Britain thank you all!)

By that time everyone had started to arrive. Sean Connery was hosting the show and so he and all of the cast (including us) spent about an hour rehearsing the curtain call as everyone had to be there, Debbie Gibson, The Pasadenas, TPau, Then Jericho, Rosanna Arquette, Maureen Lipman, Erasure, Paula Abdul, French and Saunders, Steven Wright and loads more people!

Showtime was 8 o'clock but the real thing started at 7.30 when Prince Charles and Princess Diana arrived, complete with police escorts and red carpet. All the stars line-up to meet them, accompanied by Sean Connery, and all five of us Wets were there. Prince

Charles remembered meeting us just the week before and so thanked us for helping at both events — the first thing he said to Neil was "Where were you last week!" From then on the night sped by. Our set went better than we could possibly have hoped for, great sound and no problems at all with a very good response from the audience to the two new songs.
