has been a busy year so far for the Wets, with a multitude of things happening since the last issue of "Splash".

This, as you will have noticed, is a black and white and slightly smaller edition of "Splash. This is due largely to the increased printing costs incurred on the last 2 editions.

We will still produce 4 magazines a year - 2 in this format and 2 larger, colour editions. What will not change is Splash's policy of letting you know everything that is going on with the Wets in words and pictures.

The next issue will include news on The Wets "Holding Back The River" European tour and their appearance at The John Lennon Tribute, while this edition focuses on the band's visit to Australia in April and their appearance at Glasgow's Big Day on 3 June 1990. The outcome of the promotional work has been a gold single and album in Australia - but the band had a chance to holiday as well as work, and some exclusive pictures appear on pages 7,8 and 9, along with details of what the band got up to.

Many of you have written expressing disappointment at the T.V. coverage of the Wets performance on "The Big Day". In order that you can hear what went on, we will be playing 1 track a week from the gig on the Wets phoneline number, 0898 345070. The first track will be broadcast soon, and changed weekly. Watch out for a few surprises amongst the set - the Wets playing a few of their favourite songs as well as a couple of their own hits. The phoneline acts as a complementary service to "Splash" and is a useful source of up to date information on the band. Calls are charged at 38p per minute peak time and 25p per minute at all others.

The new Wets single, which was released on 30 July 1990, is of course, "Stay With Me Heartache" on a double A-side with "I Feel Fine", as performed at The John Lennon Tribute. "Stay With Me Heartache" is a completely re'recorded and re-mixed version of "Can't Stand The Night" from the "Holding Back The River" LP. The single is released on 5 formats - 7", cassette, single, 10", 12", and C.D. - all containing extra tracks and mixes.

That's all the news for just now - but watch out for more in the full colour "Splash" 8 which will be out in the near future





June 3rd was a special day for Glasgow, with a huge street party taking place to celebrate the city's reign as European City of Culture. Four stages, of varying sizes were set up to accommodate a huge number of bands, who were either from Glasgow or had an affinity with the city.

The George Square stage, where the Wet's headlined, was home to a selection of bands from Glasgow and Dublin (the 1991 European City of Culture), with a capacity of 15000 - although some newspapers estimated the number of people in the square to be closer to 50000.

Rather than trying to recreate past glories (Glasgow Green), the Wets opted for an unusual set, concentrating mainly on cover versions by their favourite writers and singers. The set was as follows:

#### "GET READY"

A rousing Temptations anthem from the heyday of Motown Records, the big brass arrangement favoured by the Wets adding live power to the amazing vocal harmonies on the original chorus.



#### 'BRICKHOUSE'

A Commodores hit from the mid 70's - an uptempo song by a band best known for their soulful ballads. The Commodores singer at the time was Lionel Richie, whom the Wets supported in 1987 as an unknown band promoting the release of their debut single, :Wishing I was Lucky".



#### 'SECOND HAND NEWS'

The opening track from one

of the 70's most popular albums, "Rumours" by Fleetwood Mac. The lyrics were considered risque at the time, although they may seem tame by 90's standards. Nevertheless, for a song that is 15 years old, it has an amazing rhythm track, which was well ahead of its time and still stands up as proven by the Wets' version at George Square.



#### 'I FEEL FINE'

An early period Beatles' song, which the Wets first performed at the John Lennon Tribute in May. Their interpretation of the song is radically different from the original, turning Lennon & McCartney's 2 1/2 minute pop song into a five minute bluesey groove.





#### 'YOU'VE GOT A FRIEND"

No, not the Sonia/Big Fun song. "You've Got a

Friend" was written in 1971

by Carole King for James

Taylor, who was suffering

from depression at the time.

Taylor recovered and had a

huge worldwide hit with the

song, and the Wets' George

Square version owed more

to it, than King's original,

which appeared on the

multi-million selling album,

"Tapestry".

#### 'THE BIG DAY'

#### a letter from Elliot Davis, M.D. The Precious Organisation

JULY 1990

In response to your many letters and the subsequent "Right To Reply" programme on Channel 4, I would like to take this opportunity to set the record straight about the T.V. coverage given to Wet Wet during their participation in "The Big Day".

An agreement was reached with Mr Stuart Cosgrove of Liveshot (the event organisers) that the band would headline the George Square show, playing for forty minutes, 12 of which would be shown live on Channel 4, during the afternoon part of their "Big Day" coverage.

When I turned up backstage on the day of the show I was drawn into conversation by Mr Mark Mackie of the event's promoters, Regular Music (who are also co-directors of Liveshot). He informed me that the show was running fifteen minutes behind schedule, and that the Associates (the band on immediately before 'the Wets') would be asked to cut the length of their set in order to get things running on time again.

Please be aware that, in a concert situation, the promoters are TOTALLY RESPONSIBLE for time keeping, and in this respect Regular Music were to blame for allowing bands prior to "the Wets" to overrun their allotted performance time. Wet Wet have a totally proficient road crew and tour manager, who worked feverishly to set up the gear in record time, in an attempt to make up lost time.

Unfortunately, this was ultimately to no avail, and by the time the band went on stage we were fully resigned to the fact that they would not be on television. At this state, I phoned Mr Trevor Davis, another Liveshot director (in charge of legal affairs) who assured me that Wet Wet would be given a section of the evening T.V. coverage to compensate for the afternoon events. However, neither Mr Davies nor Mr Cosgrove would give me a written guarantee that this would happen.

I went to the Haugh concert at night with the intention of tracking down Mr Cosgrove. I met Mr Pete Irvine of Regular, who blamed Mr Cosgrove for "the Wets" not being on T.V. earlier, yet still believed that we would get the promised T.V. coverage.

On meeting Mr Cosgrove, he admitted that despite us having a verbal agreement for the band to get 12 minutes T.V. coverage, he was not going to give us that. In the event, it was his choice how much time was devoted to Wet Wet Wet, which as we now know, amounted to one song out of a brilliant performance, the chosen song being a duet with Aswad on "Is This Love?"

After being deluged by complaints, Channel 4 featured some of them on "Right to Reply" (9 June 1990). On this programme, Mr Cosgrove stated that Wet Wet had been booked to appear on two stages - George Square and The Haugh, and had pulled out of the latter at the last moment. AT NO TIME WAS IT AGREED THAT THE BAND WOULD PLAY BOTH STAGES, and to advertise nationally that they were doing so in the press, was an attempt by the promoters to mislead the fans, the people of Scotland and T.V. viewers all over Britain. Over that I have no jurisdiction.

In the meantime we have written to Andrea Wonfor at Channel 4 (60 Charlotte Street, London, W1) suggesting that the entire Wets performance (which was filmed) be shown as part of a 'special' on the band. If you are interested, you could write to her supporting the idea, mentioning that you have read this in Splash. Please bear in mind, however, that Ms. Wonfor had absolutely nothing to do with the events on The Big Day.

Anyway, many thanks for your support in writing to us, the producers of the show and Channel 4. If you have any comments to make, please do not hesitate to write to me c/o Splash. Thanks
