

1. Will there be another single from "Holding Back The River"?

No — it was originally planned to release "Blue For You", but things are further down the line with the third album than expected, so it seems like a good idea to wait 'til next year and get some new material out, rather than slow things up by putting another single out, and take time off promoting it.

In the meantime, the cassette only release of the songs performed at the "Big Day" is available through "Splash" — details on page 2. See Splash 7 for a full rundown on the songs that the Wets covered.

2. Will the Wets be playing live again in the near future?

No — there are no plans for any more live work now that the band are back in the studio. They have played some gigs in the last few weeks — firstly at the Ahoy in Holland, where they appeared along with Londonbeat, Wendy and Lisa and Dutch saxophonist, Candy Dulfer. This was a major show in front of 8,000 people and a European TV. audience of 10 million.

The other live sets were to substantially smaller audiences — at King Tut's Wah Wah Hut as part of a Precious Organisation showcase night, where the full band performed 2 cover versions — Jerry Butler's "Western Union Man" and Bob

Marley's "Is This Love"? One week later, Marti, Neil and the two Graeme's performed a live acoustic set for Radio Clyde, which featured three songs — "Western Union Man", "Blue For You" and Van Morrison's "Stoned Me". They also stayed around to talk about some of their favourite records — which included songs by The Blue Nile, Earth Wind & Fire, Van Morrison and AC/DC.

4. What can you tell us about the new Wets' album?

At the moment, it is still at a very early stage, and anything could happen. The band started working at home on some new songs in September, and went into a studio to rehearse them at the start of October. The songs, most of which are still untitled, will then be demoed, and with a bit of luck, work should begin on recording them properly for the album before the end of 1990. Although a lot can happen to change things it looks like the new Wets album should be out in Spring 1991.

t all began with the spectacular Glasgow Green show on 10 September 1989, when the Wets previewed their "Holding Back The River" album to an audience of nearly 80,000 people. With two major tours and two albums behind them, Wet Wet Wet had established themselves as one of Britain's finest, and most successful live attractions. It was fitting then that the tour which followed was to be the biggest they had ever embarked on.

The first part of the tour covered the U.K. and Ireland, with five pre Christmas shows — four in London and two in Ireland. There were some complaints about the lack of dates — but it was thought that the bulk of the British shows should be at the end of the tour when the band were at their very best. Nevertheless, the Christmas shows proved popular with 40,000 tickets sold in London and two sell out shows in Belfast and Dublin.

Those who got to these shows had a sneak preview of the impressive show, which had to wind its way across Europe before returning to the U.K. in March. The early reviews were positive, with the light show being singled out for special praise, alongside the stunning performances which the band were putting in. Peter Gabriel appeared as a guest to sing backing vocals at one of the Wembley Arena shows, while Kenny Dalglish and various Liverpool players joined the band on stage at London (Docklands) Arena. Being one of the first bands to play this new venue, Graeme, Tommy, Neil and Marti were asked for their handprints for the Arena's "Hall of Fame", which had

already been visited by Pink Floyd and Neneh Cherry. The Belfast and Dublin shows, as always, were a bit special, leaving everyone in the band and crew on a high as they had a deserved fortnight's break before they set off for Europe.



The European part of the tour began on 14 January 1990 at L'Espace Foire in Lille — the first of eleven dates in France — the most important of which was the show at the Zenith in Paris on 17 January,

which had a lot of press and record company people present. The dates in the South of France in late January were among the best — while it was snowing in Glasgow, the Wets were enjoying 80 degree temperatures

Thereafter the tour found its way to West Germany, Denmark, Holland and finally, Spain, one of the other highpoints being a show in Berlin, where the band had just enough time to pick up one of 1990's essential tourist items — a piece of the Berlin Wall! The next landmark on the European leg of the tour was at the Ahoy in Rotterdam — one of the biggest venues on the tour, and one to which the Wets were to return later in the year as part of the "Rock Across Europe" T.V. spectacular.



The fortnight between the end of the European dates and the first U.K. show in Aberdeen was not a relaxing time. Apart from having to do promotional work for the "Hold Back The River" single, which had just been released, there had to be further production rehearsals as the U.K. concerts were generally at larger capacity venues than those on the continent. In addition the Wets had to prepare for a special concert at The Town and Country Club in London. This took place on 27

February, and two songs were broadcast live on Channel 4's "Rocksteady" programme.

The Aberdeen shows were great — Wet Wet Wet were the first major band to play at the new Exhibition & Conference Centre up there, and both nights were filled to (6500) capacity. Other major acts have since played in Aberdeen, and the Wets are pleased to have been able to make a small contribution in helping reestablish Aberdeen as a major concert venue. So few major bands make it that far north, and the audiences who do go appreciate it all the more as a result.

After Aberdeen came two more sell out shows in North East England at the Whitley Bay Ice Rink, before three nights at the biggest and most prestigious venue on the British tour, at Birmingham's N.E.C. There were no London shows this time (it was too soon to play again after the Christmas shows) — instead it was down to the South coast for shows in St. Austell, Bournemouth and Brighton, before the final English show at the oddly named Shepton Mallet Showering Pavilion, near Bath!

March 19th was officially marked in as a day off on the tour itinery — but not ones to rest on their laurels, the Wets played their smallest show on the tour at the Solid Rock Cafe (cap: 200) with the full band (including horn section) played for forty-five minutes to a jam packed venue. It was the same the following night — only the place was different and a mere fifty times the size of the Solid Rock, when the band played the first of their two triumphant homecoming nights in Glasgow.

March 21st was the last day of the tour, and the final show was a high spirited affair — ending with a thirty minute version of "Temptation". One of the tour highlights, the acoustic version of "Broke Away" was recorded, and will be appearing on a compilation album due out next year in aid of the Oscar Marzaroli Trust. After the gig, it was party time, before a totally exhausted band and crew retired to bed for the rest of the week!

As you will see from the listing of tour dates, the "Holding Back The River" tour, was a lengthy and ardous outing for the band, especially the European leg. Splash asked Marti about this and other aspects of the tour.

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SPLASH

The tour must have been really hard work — you performing nearly every night for weeks. How did you find it?

MARTI

"It was very strenuous at first, because we started the tour in Britain, where we were very well catered for — staying in the very best of hotels. By the time we got to Europe it was getting a little more funky. By that I mean the standard of hotels was coming down and there was a lot more emphasis on doing a lot of gigs in a short period

of time. It was a lot more rock & roll. Eventually it did take its toll. It's like most things — the longer you are on the road, the more tedious it becomes. Not actually playing — just the getting from A to B, staying in different hotels, that kind of thing — but we managed to get through it".

SPLASH

Which of the gigs on tour stood out for you — both for good and bad reasons?

MART

"I think the gig I liked most was when we played at the Zenith in Paris. It was fantastic. I think the worst one would have to be one in a town called Caen in France. It was a complete nightmare. Just one of these shows where nothing seems to come together in the stage act or anything. There is also something to be learned from that as well, and there was, because the best gig was

the one right after that in Paris. Just when you think it is getting really bad, it becomes really good".

SPLASH

Do you get much time to see places when you are on tour and was there any place that you particularly liked?

MARTI

"There is a place called Pau in France which is at the bottom of the Pyrenese mountains, very close to Spain, and that was especially memorable for me. The scenery was brilliant, the people were great and the food was good — that part of France was totally unique".

SPLASH

What do you find to be the main differences between British and European audiences?

MARTI

"It varies from country to country. In Britain, we have lost a lot of our teeny bop following, while managing to retain some of it, and progressed on to a more adult audience. In Europe, it's right across the board — in Holland we still have a very young audience, whereas in Germany it is much older".

SPLASH

Especially in Britain, you have taken the live show to such a high level, it's going to be hard to top it. How will you do that?



MARTI

"There will always be things you can do to kick it up a gear. If you take people like Pink Floyd or The Rolling Stones, where you can start to use props or lasers. In our case, I think the way that we will improve the live show is for the songs to get better and more mature, because at the end of the day, that's really what it's about. There are some acts who can go out on tour with no major stage show, and people will still come away saying it was one of the best shows they have ever seen, because the songs were so good. I think that's what it boils down to with Wet Wet Wet".

SPLASH

Finally, what are the plans for future gigs?

MARTI

"We don't have any plans made just now. Obviously, we will tour when the next album comes out, but you never know what we will do sometimes we just have a notion to do some small gigs, and then go out and do them".



INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE TOUR

- The Holding Back The River Tour took in 33 towns/cities, and consisted of a total 42 gigs.
- 2. The European leg of the tour involved a crew of 30 people—the British shows had 39 people working behind the scenes, including 3 sound technicians and 6 lighting technicians.
- 3. On the European section of the tour, the band and crew travelled over 6,000 miles between venues.
- 4. During the European leg of the tour the band did 24 shows in 36 days, and in the U.K. they did 13 shows in 19 days.
- 5. If each show lasted about 1 hr. 45 mins., the Wets performed for a total of 4,515 minutes or 75 1/4 hours on the whole tour.
- 6. The longest overnight journey for the crew was the 10 hour (385 mile) trip between Berlin and Dusseldorf on 6th/7th February.
- 7. Live versions of "I Can Give You Everything" and "With A Little Help From My Friends", recorded on the tour have been released on vinyl, and Radio Clyde broadcast one of the Wembley Arena shows on Christmas Day 1989.
- 8. The only songs from "Holding Back The River" not performed on the tour were "You've Had It" and "Maggie May" all the band's singles were performed each night.
- 9. The extended version of "Temptation" which ended the shows, included snippets of various classic rock songs including "Walk On The Wild Side" and "The Israelites". Last show in Glasgow it lasted an incredible 35 minutes.

And like their free concert at Glasgow Green in September – which attracted 70,000 – it was a thank you to their home city.


Fans began to queue from 10 am for the group going on stage at 5.15 pm.

A band spokesman said: "We decided to give the fans something for nothing."

Bar manager Crawford Scott added: "We didn't need to be asked twice."

On Friday 16th March, the Wets decided that, rather than have a day off before their two end of tour shows in Glasgow, they would set up, and play a secret pub gig in the city on Monday 19th.

It did not leave much time to get organised, and during the course of the Friday afternoon, the office had to arrange the venue, and some low key publicity so that people would know that something was happening, even though they wouldn't all know that the Wets were involved.

The venue chosen was the Solid Rock Cafe on Hope Street, which is more famous for being a bit of a biker hangout and for putting on heavy metal bands — hardly the kind of venue you would expect to see Wet Wet Wet in! It has a capacity of around 200, and is right in the centre of Glasgow, about a mile and a half from where the Wets were to play in front of 20,000 people over the next two nights.

In the meantime, work was afoot to put together some leaflets, which were designed (sic), photocopied and distributed round Glasgow's pubs within six hours! The band had decided to play under their original name, VORTEX MOTION, so only Wets' fans would pick up on the significance when they saw the leaflets, or its brief mention in the Daily Record. Like any other unknown band, Vortex Motion were relying, for one day only, on a big turn out of friends, family and people who had heard of the gig through word of mouth to ensure that the Solid Rock Cafe was not empty on the Monday afternoon.

By 11 o'clock on the Monday morning, Wets' fans who had heard about the show were starting to gather outside the venue, and by 3p.m. the crowds were mounting, with nearly 500 people finally turning up before the gig started at 5 o'clock. Needless to say, not all of them could get in, but the show could still be heard from the street, meaning that the crowd did not immediately disperse.

The full band appeared, including the brass section, and played a forty five minute set, which included a good cross section of the songs played on the tour, including "Hold Back The River", "Temptation", "Sweet Surrender" and "I Wish". The gig was covered extensively in the local media, with both BBC Scotland and Scottish Television covering the show for their evening news bulletin programmes, and photographs appearing in all the following day's national papers.

The Solid Rock Cafe is not the only impromptu show the band have played in the past few months. On the 29th June, they were special guests on the final programme in the Radio One series, the Jonathan Ross Show, which was being broadcast from King Tut's Wah Wah Hut in Glasgow. They played three songs live on air, in acoustic form, including "Hold Back The River" and "Stoned Me", before going on to run through some more cover versions from their "Big Day" set, including "Is This Love" and "Second Hand News".

King Tut's was again the venue for the Wets' to make an unannounced appearance as part of a Precious Organisation showcase with three other acts on 27th September. This time the two Graemes, Tommy, Neil and Marti ran through two cover versions, "Western Union Man" and "Is This Love" to a packed audience of 300 people.

So why do the Wets do so many of these kind of gigs? After all, there is no real need for them. Neil explains: "It is good to be able to strip things down and just get back to basics after you have been doing big budget, big production shows. It is like getting back to your roots, and when you play in that sort of environment you have got to be good, there is no way of hiding any mistakes you make."

Marti also enjoys these kinds of shows, and recalls the main differences between playing at the Solid Rock and the S.E.C.C.: "I guess the smell of sweat is a bit more pungent in the small venues," he says, "And the atmosphere is very much more contained — people are standing about four or five inches away from your face, and the emphasis is very much on delivering and performing. You've just got to get back to the roots of the whole thing and let the music do the talking.

"Standing in a small place for us is great", he continues. "It's like a chance to kick back a gear from a big show with big lights and big p.a. and take a step back to where it is like one guitar, one bass, drums and 1, 2, 3, 4 ...

"I think we work brilliantly under that type of pressure because we now are performers. We have grown and we have a lot of confidence in ourselves as people, and to get a chance to see Wet Wet Wet in that kind of situation is quite unique, and not one to be missed. We enjoy it enormously, and the people who come to see it think it is just too much."

So after this year's small shows, is there any chance of them being repeated elsewhere sometime in the future? "Oh yeah, we'll always do that," says Marti. "There's talk of us doing something at Christmas, although you never know. We are the sort of guys who say 'Let's go out and do a gig tomorrow' because that's the kind of musicians we are. We would love to go under a different name and do a tour of places like the Dog and Bone in Scunthorpe, or wherever. We enjoy doing that sort of thing."

Whether anything of this sort happens is, of course, down to whether it can be fitted around the Wets' packed work schedule, but don't be too surprised if you come across them playing when and where you least expect it!


