JOHN LENNON TRIBUTE

ohn Lennon has always been one of the Wets' heroes, so when the chance arose to take part in a tribute concert celebrating his musical achievements, they did not need to be asked twice.

1990 should have marked Lennon's 50th birthday, instead it was a much sadder anniversary — ten years after his death — which was being commemorated in Liverpool.

Put together with the cooperation of Lennon's widow. Yoko Ono, the John Lennon Tribute took place at a specially constructed and spectacular location in Liverpool, the Beatle's home town. The site was Pier Head, and the date Saturday 5th May 1990.

The idea was that the event would be an international T.V. spectacular, with many of the biggest names in popular music, each performing their favourite John Lennon song. As things turned out, the day was not a huge success, the high ticket prices (£25) and the choice of

many American orientated acts, combining to leave the arena only half full.

Nevertheless, Wet Wet Wet's rendition of "I Feel Fine" was one of the highlights of a show which also featured outstanding contributions from Cyndi Lauper, Natalie Cole and Hall & Oates.

"I Feel Fine" was one of Lennon's earliest songs, which the Wets worked into a longer, blue feel: Marti explained their choice of song:

The title of the song was something in itself which we related to. Things had been going

well for the band and we had had enormous success, then we were asked to do the John Lennon Tribute — it just seemed like the right choice. We wanted to do a completely different interpretation of the song — very r&b, very bluesey. The highlight of the day was when Yoko Ono came up to us and said that she thought John would have been very impressed by our version of the song, because he was a great blues fan. Whether or not she said that to every act on the bill, I don't know, but it was still good for us to hear that."

"It was just quite a privilege to be involved in that kind of

event," added Neil. "It is good to be in the company of artists like Hall and Oates and Cyndi Lauper, and know that you are considered good enough to be able to perform on the same bill as them."


However, all the band members had reservations about the Tribute event, despite being justifiably pleased with their own contribution.

"I can categorically say that if John were alive today, he would have hated the whole thing. The most disappointing thing about the whole day is that it was £25 a ticket and it was based in Liverpool. We all know what the job situation is like there — I don't think the real people, the Scousers actually got to see it — and that was a shame."

"Not only that, there was only one Liverpool band on the bill, The Christians, and the whole thing was aimed at America. I think John Lennon was lost a lot to America because he was made larger than life, in the same way that The Beatles and The Stones and a lot of other things were. The show was geared to a US t.v. audience and not the community in Liverpool which John had a very great love for — it was an anti-climax, not helped by the fact that the rest of the Beatles weren't involved. I think they saw it for what it was, and looked for other ways to contribute to the trust".

In spite of its many shortcomings, the John Lennon Tribute was the scene of one of the best Wet Wet Wet performances of 1990, and a memorial to one of the greatest songwriters of all time.

EUROPEAN SPECIAL OLYMPIC GAMES

July 21st was a very special day for Glasgow, marking the opening of the 1990 European Special Olympics, one of the least published and most prestigious events of Glasgow's reign as European City of Culture.


The event is based on a similar American gathering, where mentally and physically disabled athletes get together to compete for the honours in a show of sporting excellence. The U.S. event has had the backing of major stars like Arnold Schwarzeneger, Melanie Griffith and Don Johnson, the latter pair also attending the opening of the Glasgow event, which took place on one of the hottest days of the year in front of a capacity crowd of over 50,000 at Celtic Park. Tickets had been distributed free via the local newpapers, and it was an event which Marti was particularly proud to have been associated with.

"The Special Olympics was a great day for Wet Wet," he recalled, "It was up there with the Nelson Mandela Concert, and to lead out the Scottish team of -handicapped athletes was a great

thrill. These people, in their own fields, be it the javelin or the long jump or whatever are true champions, when you consider their problems and what they have to deal with."

"For us to be involved in such an event was just fantastic. It didn't get the publicity it justly deserved, but if we can get involved with charities like that, it makes us feel better as people and gives us a chance to give something back."

Indeed, the Wets were not alone in lending their support to the event, and other celebrities were involved in leading out the various national teams. Eire and Celtic goalkeeper, Pat Bonner, fresh from his heroics in the World Cup lead out the Irish team while there were also a wide range of musical participants. The Wets performed 2 songs, "Stay With Me Heartache" and "Hold Back The River," and were ably assisted by the other acts taking part — Lisa Stansfield (from England), Taylor Dayne and Patti Austin (from USA) and Roxette (from Sweden).

The Special Olympics are not the only good cause the Wets

have supported in 1990, although the number of charity requests they get makes it totally impossible for them to help everyone who asks for their support. With the exception of Childline and a few major charity concerts like The Princes Trust, the band like to keep their charitable contributions low key, as the point of the exercise not being self-publicity but to help the causes in question.

Among those organisations that

the Wets work with on an ongoing basis are Dreams Come True, The Starlight Foundation, Childline, Children In Need and Cash For Kids — but how do the band choose which projects to become involved with? Marti:

While the band have always, and will continue to be involved in charities and good causes, Marti has one final thought on the whole issue:

"What makes you decide is very much a band thing — and it — but we tend to look for charities that all 4 of us agree that."

"We wouldn't like to be remembered as a big charity that's the way we have gone band," he concluded, "or have about our whole career. If 2 people thinking what great guys people want to do something we are, but it is nice to give and 2 don't, then we usually do something back, and we are in a great position to be able to do





FESTIVE SEASON WITH WET WET

Being in a pop band is not one of the best ways of ensuring that you have a quiet and peaceful festive season. Over the past five years, Wet Wet Wet have not had a great deal of time to go Christmas shopping!

1986 The year before the Wets made it into the public eye, they played their first gig since returning from Memphis at Glasgow College of Technology on 12th December. The band were still in rehearsal over Christmas as they prepared for one of their first major gigs at The Barrowland, where they were supporting King on Hogmanay (New Year's Eve). This show was being recorded for one of their earliest television appearances on "Reporting Scotland".

1987 Another dramatic festive season, with two brilliant homecoming shows at the S.E.C.C. In Glasgow on 21st/22nd December were followed by Marti being admitted to hospital on Christmas Eve to have his tonsils removed. No visitors on Christmas Day!!

1988 After a year of solid touring, much of it in America with Elton John, the band returned from the States and went straight into the recording studio to start work on "Holding Back The River". Also an appearance on the Christmas Day "Top of the Pops" to mark "With A Little Help From My Friends" being one of the year's biggest singles. In the end the band had one week at home before Christmas, and were soon back in the studio after New Year.

1989 Two shows in Ireland the week before Christmas, culminated at Belfast King's Hall on 22nd December. Home on the 23rd, and just enough time to recover for the start of the European dates in January

1990 Again, the band are in the studio in the run up to Christmas, and Graeme vows: "We will make a determined effort to have a bit of a break at Christmas this year. We all stay at home over Christmas as it is a great time to be with your family and friends, and this year won't be any exception."

''IN TH

ork has begun on the follow up to "Holding Back The River," after a year of touring and promotion, in which hardly any new songs have been written, the band are as you read this probably holed up in some recording studio turning their new ideas into songs.

"We usually start working at home" says Neil explaining the writing process. "I'll come up with a keyboard line or idea, or Graeme will come up with something on the guitar or bass, and then we'll swap ideas. Graeme has a studio in his house, and things will be developed their with Marti and Tommy. Sometimes they will come up with the first ideas — it is very much an equal process."

"In terms of this album, its at a very early stage to talk about," adds Marti. "It's all in demo form, ideas are floating around, and we are getting back to old ideas which haven't really been developed and have been lying around for a while."

As to how the album will sound, Neil and Marti are both cautious predicting how it will turn out. Neil hints that there may be a leaning back towards the songs on the first album coupled with the sophistication of the second, while Marti reckons it will be completely different from either.

"I feel it will be a very strange direction for Wet Wet. We don't set out to make a particular kind of album, we never have, and I don't think we ever will. I think this album will be another shocker. Right now, we are only three albums down the line. We are still feeling around for our kind of music, and I jus' haven't a clue how it will sound. Thankfully."

HE STUDIO"

One thing that is not in doubt, is that this time around the band will not be producing the album entirely on their own. Marti:

"We are really excited about various other producers at this moment in time. We have contacted some people, and they seem very much up for working with us, which is good, so we are looking forward to getting down to some serious meetings with producers and then just getting on with it!" In the meantime, the band have taken their latest recordings to a studio in Glasgow for some work, before moving on to Lincolnshire where they are currently working, with a view to completing some demos before Christmas. When any new material sees the light of day is subject to a number of factors, but, assuming things go well, there should be something out in the Spring/early summer of 1991.





On 4th October 1990, the two Graemes, Neil and Marti did a special acoustic session for the 'Fast Forward' show on Radio Clyde.

In the Radio Clyde studio they performed spirited live versions of Jenny Butler's "Western Union Man", Van Morrison's "And It Stoned Me" and their own song "Blue For You".


After performing, the band were interviewed and asked to choose some of their favourite music. Graeme Clark went for "Tinseltown In The Rain" by The Blue Nile, to remind him of their recent gigs; Marti chose "Warm Love'' by Van Morrison (a perennial favourite); and the next, somewhat unexpected choice was "You Shook Me All Night Long" by AC/DC, which Marti and Graeme explained by saying that it reminded them of driving across Australia. The sequence was rounded off by an Earth, Wind & Fire song, selected by Graeme Duffin.



After appearing as part of the 1988 Prince's Trust concert when the Wets appeared along with Joe Cocker for a rousing version of "With A Little Help From My Friends", the band were delighted to be able to take part in this worthwhile annual event again this year. Held at Wembley Arena on 18th July, Wet Wet Wet were one of three bands to perform totally live on the bill, while various others performed with the house band of session musicians.


